

FOREST PASTURE - SANCTUARY OF WILD AND TAME

Settle in to this sacred space. Sit or Walk slowly around the Pasture, QUIETLY, BREATHING IN THE INTERTWINING OF THE WILD AND TAME

FAITH INSIGHTS:



A forest pasture is a meeting place of wildness and cultivation, where trees, grasses, and animals coexist in harmony. Theologically, it can be seen as a sign of shalom the wholeness of creation living in interdependence. Like Eden, it embodies both beauty and provision: trees offering shelter, roots protecting soil, grass sustaining the horses, and in return, they fertilize the land. In this way, the forest pasture is a living parable of God's economy, where nothing exists for itself alone but all things participate in the cycle of giving and receiving. Scripture often portrays God as a shepherd who leads the flock to green pastures (Psalm 23) and as the One who plants trees by streams of living water (Ezekiel 47; Revelation 22). A forest pasture brings these images together, revealing how creation itself is a sanctuary where nourishment, rest, and communion are found. It reminds us that divine abundance is not about domination or excess but about balance, reciprocity, and care.

Reflection From Laudato Si (86, 159)

As the Catechism teaches: "God wills the interdependence of creatures. The sun and the moon, the cedar and the little flower, the eagle and the sparrow: the spectacle of their countless diversities and inequalities tells us that no creature is self-sufficient. Creatures exist only in dependence on each other, to complete each other, in the service of each other".

Once we start to think about the kind of world we are leaving to future generations, we look at things differently; we realize that the world is a gift which we have freely received and must share with others. ...Intergenerational solidarity is not optional, but rather a basic question of justice, since the world we have received also belongs to those who will follow us.

FAITH INSIGHTS:

A pollinator garden is a living liturgy of interdependence. Flowers open in beauty, offering nectar; bees, butterflies, and other small creatures carry pollen, ensuring the fruitfulness of the earth. A greenhouse is a shelter of patience and possibility. It is where fragile seedlings are tended, protected, and given the conditions to grow strong. Theologically, these are spaces of divine care. They are a parable of God's kingdom, where the smallest participants play indispensable roles (1 Cor. 12:22). It reveals the Creator's design for communion and care, where flourishing comes through mutual exchange and shared vulnerability.

When your spirit is ready, reflect on Laudato Si' and what message is being revealed to you by Your Creator ...

Reflection From Laudato Si (84)

The entire material universe speaks of God's love, his boundless affection for us. Soil, water, mountains: everything is, as it were, a caress of God. The history of our friendship with God is always linked to particular places which take on an intensely personal meaning; we all remember places, and revisiting those memories does us much good. Anyone who has grown up in the hills or used to sit by the spring to drink, or played outdoors in the neighborhood square; going back to these places is a chance to recover something of their true selves.

If everything is sacred and a place where God reveals God-self, how could care for creation become visible in your daily life?

FARM ANIMALS AS FELLOW-CREATURES AND TEACHERS OF GRACE

sit or Walk slowly to find the goats and or ducks, quietly, breathing in the grace filled existence of our brothers and sisters



FAITH INSIGHTS:

In Christian theology, animals are not only resources but fellow-creatures within God's creation (Genesis 1:20–25). Ducks, chickens, and goats each show us something about God. Perhaps Ducks, able to move between water, land, and air, point to creation's adaptability and remind us of the Spirit who moves across all places. Chickens, with their steady patterns of foraging and nesting, reflect God's daily provision. Goats, hardy and energetic, show both resilience and joy, qualities that help life endure. Together, these animals illustrate our interdependence: humans are part of the same household of God (oikos), where every creature has a role in the well-being of the whole. They help us see that God's love reaches through all creation and is gathered up in the Eucharist, where the whole world is offered and blessed.

Stay in their presence. Honor them. Imagine ways of eating that honors the sanctity of their life. Then Meditate on the words of Laudato Si'

Reflection From Laudato Si (236)



In the Eucharist, fullness is already achieved; it is the living centre of the universe, ...the whole cosmos gives thanks to God. Indeed the Eucharist is itself an act of cosmic love.

The Eucharist joins heaven and earth; it embraces and penetrates all creation. The world which came forth from God's hands returns to him in blessed and undivided adoration: in the bread of the Eucharist, ... Thus, the Eucharist is also a source of light and motivation for our concerns for the environment, directing us to be stewards of all creation.

DO YOU IMAGINE OUR COSMIC BRETHREN AS PARABLES REVEALING SOMETHING OF GOD? DO YOU DELIGHT IN THE WORLD BECAUSE THE EUCHARIST IS ITS LIVING CENTER?

Pray on how your embodied life is intertwined with theirs. Discern the spiritual significance of your dependency on plant and animal life and death

COMPOST AS SACRED TRANSFORMATION

SETTLE IN TO THIS SACRED SPACE. SIT OR STAND BY THE COMPOST AREA, QUIETLY, PONDERING THE CIRCLE OF LIFE INGRAINED INTO OUR PLANET WHICH WE OFTEN IGNORE



FAITH INSIGHTS:

Compost can be understood as a parable of death and resurrection. What appears to be waste, decay, death and loss is in truth the material through which God's renewing work unfolds. Just as the grain of wheat must fall to the ground and die in order to bear fruit (John 12:24), so organic matter surrenders its form, becoming soil teeming with unseen life. Compost is thus sacramental: an earthy sign of the Creator's promise that nothing in creation is wasted, but all is drawn into cycles of renewal. It is a practice of humility and hope, reminding us that even our scraps and failures can be gathered into God's work of restoration.

Stay a while as this sacred transformation quietly unfolds. Death and decay is being absorbed in the darkness of the piles of matter leading to new life. Then let Laudato Si' permeate your imagination

Reflection From Laudato Si (217)

The external deserts in the world are growing, because the internal deserts have become so vast". For this reason, the ecological crisis is also a summons to profound interior conversion.

It must be said that some committed and prayerful Christians, with the excuse of realism and pragmatism, tend to ridicule expressions of concern for the environment. Others are passive; they choose not to change their habits and thus become inconsistent.

So what they all need is an "ecological conversion", whereby the effects of their encounter with Jesus Christ become evident in their relationship with the world around them. Living our vocation to be protectors of God's handiwork is essential to a life of virtue; it is not an optional or a secondary aspect of our Christian experience.
